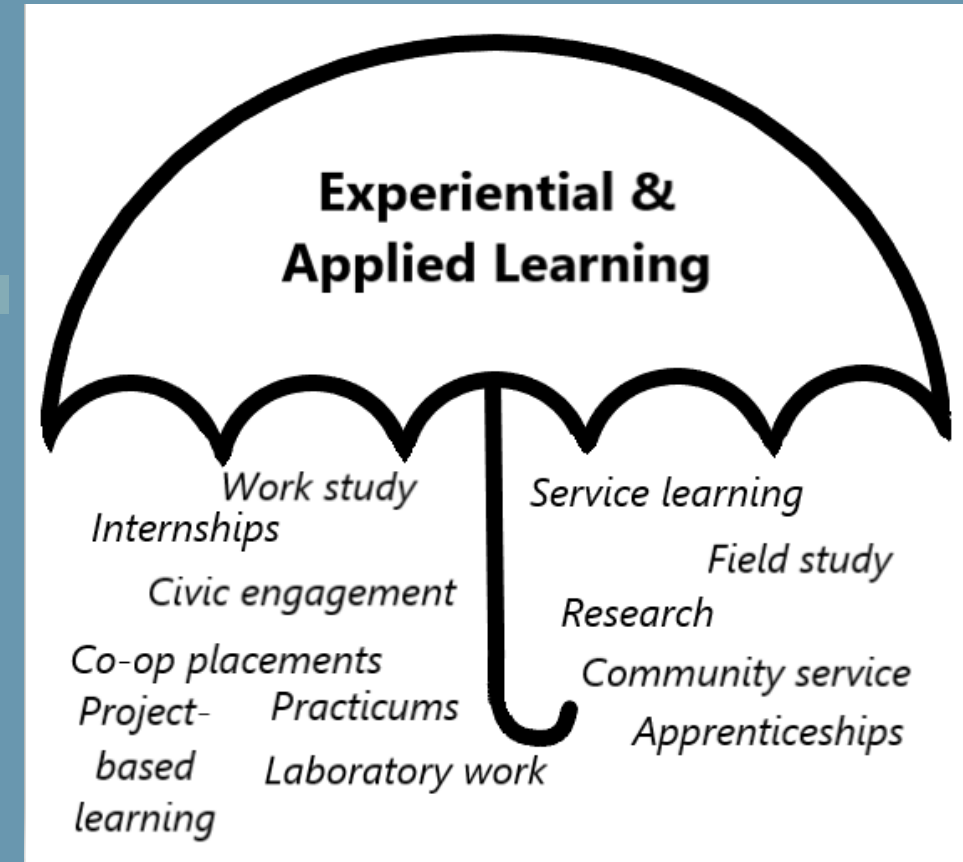
Problem Statement

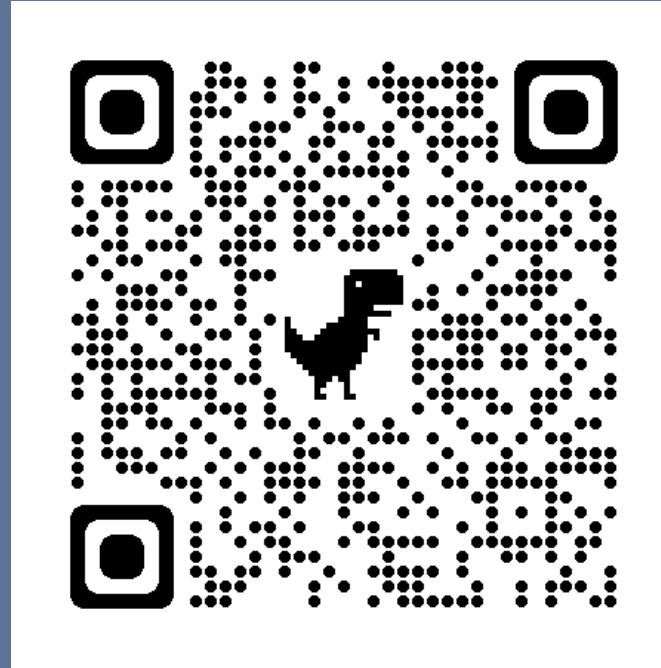
The first move in the Game of Life is to pick a path. As you spin the spinner, the question before you is "what kind of experience are you looking for?"

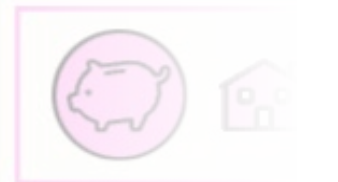

What Design Works Before for You?

Independent Research (Directed Independent Research, Honors in the Major, etc.)	Research Intensive (RI) Courses:
<p>Flexibility: Allows for more flexibility in terms of project selection, timeline, and workload. You can often tailor the research to your specific interests and schedule.</p> <p>Autonomy: You have more control over the direction of the project and the methods used. This can be appealing if you have a clear research question or idea you want to pursue.</p> <p>One-on-one mentorship: Involves working closely with a faculty mentor which can provide more individualized guidance and support.</p> <p>Prerequisite knowledge: May require a stronger foundation in the subject matter and research methods, as you'll be working more autonomously.</p> <p>Long-term projects: Can span multiple semesters or even years, allowing for deeper exploration of a topic and potentially leading to conference presentations or publications.</p>	<p>Structure: Provide a structured research experience with clear expectations, deadlines, and deliverables. This can be beneficial if you prefer a more guided approach to research.</p> <p>Graded coursework: Often involve graded assignments and assessments, which can provide motivation and accountability for completing the research project.</p> <p>Classroom setting: Involve a classroom component, which can provide opportunities for learning research methods, discussing findings, and collaborating with peers.</p> <p>Exposure to new topics: May expose you to research topics and methods that you hadn't previously considered, broadening your perspective and skill set.</p> <p>Shorter time commitment: Typically last one semester, which can be appealing if you have a busy schedule or want to explore research without a long-term commitment.</p>

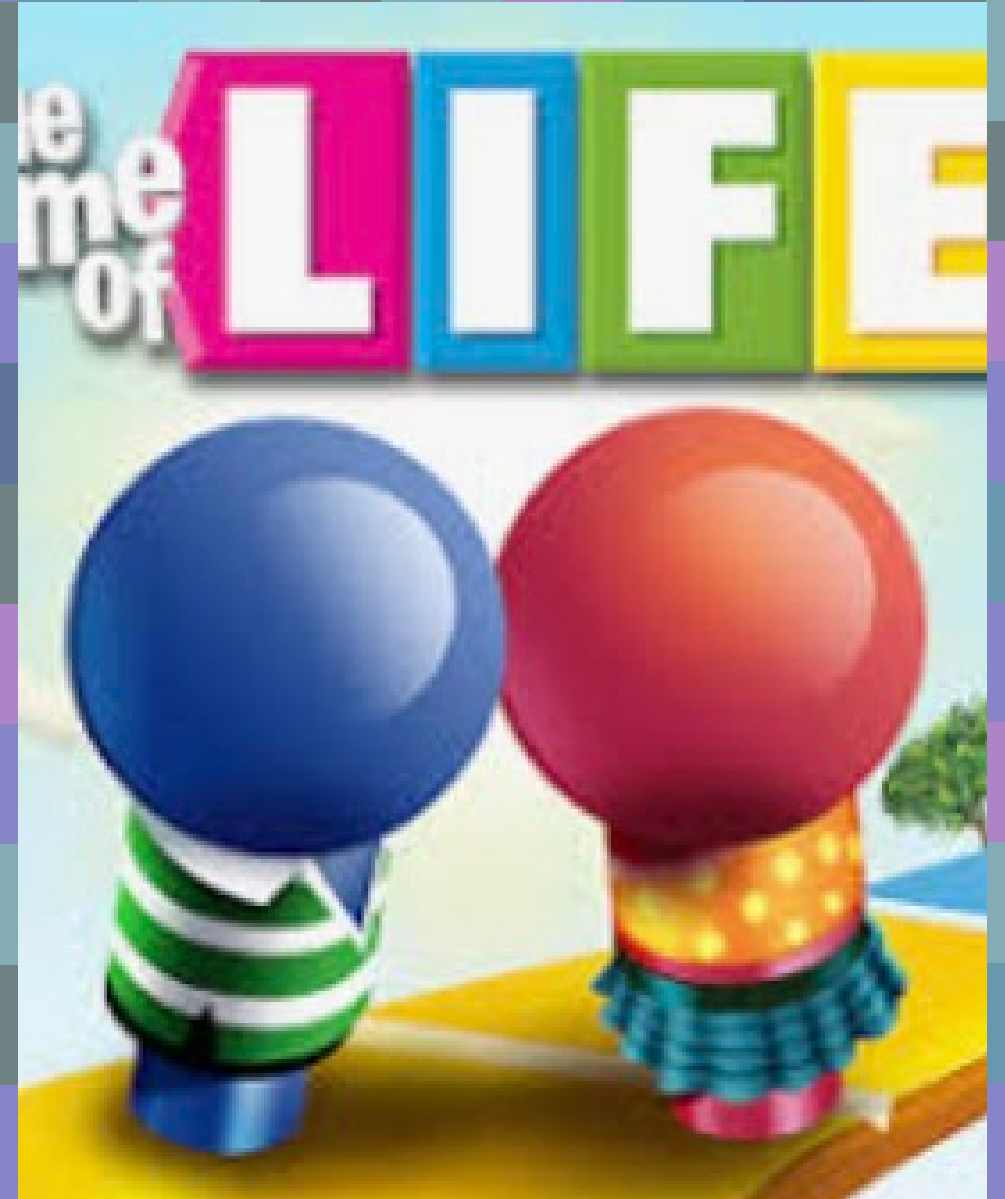

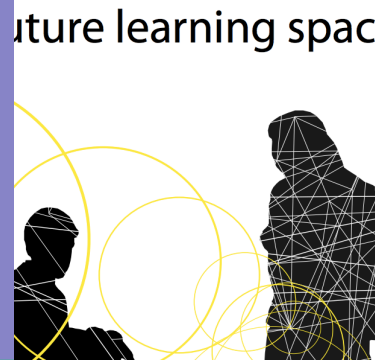
